Oh, how abundant is your goodness, which you have stored up for those who fear you. Ps. 31:19a o you remember root cellars? Some still exist on farms in the region. Root cellars are both wonderful and scary — wonderful because they are a storehouse of food, and scary because they are underground and dark and have a dirt floor and maybe a spider or two.

and others are too much the city folk to really envision what I'm writing about. But farm folk on the Great Plains know well what root cellars are.

My Grandma and Grandpa Kraenzel had a root cellar on their little ranch on the east edge of Hebron, N.D. Most of the wonderful stuff that went into the big, sheltered hole in the ground that was their root cellar came from Grandma's large garden. In the summer, my sister, Kelli, and I used to raid Grandma's garden for peas and beans and radishes and carrots and an occasional kohlrabi. We'd stand there and eat those veggies right out of the garden. We wiped off most of the dirt, but a veggie straight out of the garden can never be perfectly clean.

When we were brave enough, especially in late summer and early fall, we'd venture down into the root cellar (located not so far from the garden) and stare in awe at the canned beans and tomatoes, the chokecherry jelly, the canned chicken and beef. Oh, and there were dill pickles too. Bags of potatoes and carrots lay on the cool earth floor. (It was amazing how long those potatoes and carrots would last!)

Talk about an underground storehouse of goodness! That's what a root cellar is. That storehouse would provide food throughout the fall and winter and following spring, until the next harvest could be gathered from the garden and preserved for later use, stored there in the root cellar.

In Psalm 31, David, the psalmist, talks about God's goodness, which He has "stored up" for those who fear Him.

Hmm, could God have a root cellar, too, where His gifts are stored up? Sounds like it to me! Well, not a root cellar exactly, but God certainly maintains a storehouse, and it's for you. It's a supply of forgiveness that never runs out, flowing from Christ's cross. It's peace and hope, glowing out of Christ's empty tomb. It's a purpose, never-ending for the living out of your earthly days as you have opportunity, daily, to

LUTHERANS FOR LIFE

Dear friends in Christ,

Last month I shared my friend Kim's story. Born in South Korea, Kim was abandoned by her parents. She was eventually adopted by a family in Milwaukee, to whom she was introduced via the family's involvement in

the foster-care system.

The foster-care system is no small topic within the work of our Life Ministry. I felt bad I could only make a passing reference to it in my last story. However, not long afterward, I was in Aberdeen to record a sermon and service for the Main Street Living program. The video inset for these programs features our district's American Sign Language interpreter, Lynda Nix.

Lynda and I ended up walking to our vehicles together after the recording. I asked about her interpretive work and learned that she is also a full-time school social worker in the Harrisburg School District. Lynda's husband, Rev. Matthew, serves as pastor of Christ Lutheran Church and Trinity Lutheran Church of the Deaf in Sioux Falls.

The Nixes' story is wonderful. When Lynda and Matthew were first together, ministry was

not on their radar. Lynda had studied accounting as an undergraduate student. Matthew worked as a computer programmer for a defense contractor. One day, as Lynda tells the story, Matthew came home from work and said, "I think I need to go to seminary. I want to be a pastor."

As their story unfolded, Lynda was connected to the Church Interpreter Training Institute, a program organized by the Millneck Foundation and

> Lutheran Friends of the Deaf. The month-long adventure led her to a ministry serving high school youth in Toledo, Ohio. It was that work that prepared her heart for the social work she does now.

Lynda had always been a people person, but social work had never crossed her mind.

Now, though, she sees regularly how Jesus works through her efforts.

"I don't need to force faith on anyone," she says. "I simply wear my faith."

This story is amazing in itself (especially if you ever get a chance to hear about Lynda's internship work in Yankton), but there is more to tell. Like many couples, the Nix family had difficulty conceiving. Lynda puts it bluntly: "We had one child, lost two babies, had five, then lost another."

The three babies known to Jesus would be 19, 30 and 32 today.

Matthew's work in ministry, Lynda's social work and the continuous activity of five children makes for a busy household. Indeed, Lynda tells stories of their backyard activities that have included 20 or more children at a time. As the Nixes prepared to become empty-nesters with their five children all nearly grown, they recognized a unique opportunity. Matthew and Lynda volunteered to be respite caregivers for a foster family. The foster family cared for a deaf, autistic child whose mother was addicted to meth. As the Lord would have it by His Spirit, the Nixes were moved to compassion. With one year to go until all of their children had moved out, Matthew told Lynda that he felt they should be this child's forever family.

The Nixes have only grown more involved in foster care since then. The need for neglected children to have loving homes moves them to act. Gov. Kristi Noem recently reported that there are 833 foster families in the state, but as many as 1,738 children in the custody of the Department of Social Services (DSS). The 833 families provide care for only 995 - or 57 percent — of the 1,738. According to a May 11 Argus Leader article, "'Foster parents are needed in communities across the state especially for teens, sibling groups, Native American youth and children with special needs,' a DSS representative said. 'There are also 79 youth who are legally free and available for adoption."

To people thinking about fostering a child, Lynda insists, "Please do. Anything you offer is better than the nothing many of these children currently have."

Ask the Nixes what you need to do as a foster parent and they will tell you, "Just care."

Moreover, South Dakota District friends, the main reason the Nixes are investing themselves in this work is that the kids have such a hunger for the Good News of Jesus. The Gospel promises unconditional love in Christ and eternal belonging by God's grace to every newborn Christian through Baptism. Without that message, Lynda says, many of the older kids in the system have stopped trying to become attached because it hurts too much to continu-

Mariachi San Pablo coming to South Dakota!

Mariachi San Pablo, an outreach and care ministry of Ysleta Lutheran Mission Human Care (YLM) in El Paso, Texas, seeking to serve, unite and reach others through unique Mariachi music, will perform three public concerts in South Dakota Aug. 27-29. The concerts are made possible through a district Harvest Grant received by Faith Lutheran Church, Pierre.

Mariachi San Pablo is an LCMS Recognized Service Organization. Youth and adult members proclaim the saving Gospel of Christ via music and message, shared in both English and Spanish. The group has performed at churches, community events, conferences and conventions in 18 states and 105 cities since it was formed in 2001. Their motto is "Changing Lives Through Music."

Faith, Pierre, will host the band members and is coordinating with other South Dakota congregations to help with planning the concerts.

Ultimately, the Mariachi band aims to glorify God in song and Word and plant seeds of Christ's love during its concerts. The band also hopes to raise awareness across the LCMS about YLM and its work. Members of Faith,

Dennis Ryckman, who leads the mission group, said, "We are so happy to be used by God to spread His Word and then return to our daily lives ready to do the same. We pray that many more congregations will begin sponsoring mission teams to go to YLM after hearing about YLM through these concerts."

'In All Things'

LCMS School Ministry has released the 2021–2022 edition of Chapel Talks for Lutheran Schools, an annual resource designed

to assist Lutheran schools with weekly chapel.

Under the theme "In All Things," the resource includes devotions for every week of the school year as well as for Christmas. The theme, which will also be used during National Lutheran Schools Week and at the 2022 LCMS Youth Gathering, is based on Colossians 1:15–20:

"He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation. For by him all things were created, in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or authorities — all things were created through him and for him. And he is before all things, and in him all things hold together.



"And he is the head of the body, the church. He is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, that in everything he might be preeminent. For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, making peace by the blood of his cross."

Drawing on the theme, each devotion is organized around various types of "things":

- "First Things" are introductory thoughts or activities that connect to the week's theme;
- "The Main Thing" shares Law and Gospel exploration of the text and brings Christ and His redemptive work to the students;

- "All Things in Jesus' Name" offers a petition relevant to the theme; and
- "More Things" provides suggestions for carrying the devotion beyond the chapel setting through additional activities, further reflection and study.

Chapel Talks was written by the Rev. Bob Riggert, a former Lutheran teacher, principal, parish pastor and district education executive who has written the last seven editions of the resource. It includes a new hymn by Jeffrey Burkhart, "In All Things Jesus Christ Is Found," sung to the tune WAS GOTT TUD ("What God Ordains Is Always Good," *LSB* 760).

Riggert writes in the introduction: "'In All Things' is a confession of Christ's redemptive work ... a celebration of the Christ for youth, children and adults of the church ... [and] an opportunity for Lutheran schools to worship Christ in all things."
