Dutch, a member of Zion Lutheran Church, Sioux Falls, was instrumental in the founding of Main Street Living in 2001, and the program launched on Jan. 6, 2002, the Epiphany of Our Lord. Since beginning in the Sioux Falls television market, MSL has spread to Rapid City and today, under Dutch's leadership, is broadcast also from television stations in Fargo-Moorhead and Bismarck, N.D.; Sioux City, Iowa; Lincoln and Omaha, Neb.; Minneapolis, Minn.; and Eau Claire-La

Crosse, Wis. In addition, MSL planted the seeds and helped to fund a similar TV program broadcast from Duluth, Minn.

Of all of that, Dutch would say, "This is God's doing, not mine." But God works through and with His people! And so, while we certainly thank God for the growth of MSL, we also thank Dutch for his long, loving and faithful service in helping to get the Good News of Jesus out into the region via Christ-centered televised worship services and programs like *This Is the Life*, *Kids' Crossing* and *On Main Street*. On April 17, a group representing three district congregations participated in an Ongoing Ambassadors for Christ evangelism weekend at St. Paul's. Aberdeen.

Rev. Sam Bobby, St. Paul's senior pastor, led the participants in a Bible study on the way of Jesus Christ — in contrast to the way of the world. Rev. Martin

Herzberg, pastor of Our Savior, Wilmot, and Trinity, Corona, led the group in singing and Rev. Timothy Koch, pastor of Emanuel, Milbank, shared witnessing tips with the attendees.

My friend Kim

Dear friends in Christ,

have been anxiously awaiting an opportunity to share my friend Kim's life story. Recent events have created a fertile and relevant context. In March, while stimulus payments were being sent to Americans across the country, Planned Parenthood rejoiced to receive their share ... \$50 million in fact.

Numbers and institutions are impersonal, so I really wanted to put a face on this issue. I wanted to teach people about the long-term impact a culture hostile to children has on a nation. Then I received an email update from Live Action. The article was titled "Due to population control, one South Korean island (Nokdo) has just three children remaining." The article relayed a Reuters report declaring, "the death rate is now higher than the birth rate."

Parallel articles on CNN's website insist this is because of problems with fertility in South Korea. That is not the whole truth, Live Action reports. "Nokdo's birth slump began when South Korea began heavily promoting a family planning program to its residents in the 1970s and 1980s, urging people to be sterilized." No wonder South Korea has fertility problems! This is where Kim's story comes to life.

Kim was born in South Korea in 1976. Within the pressure of this cultural hostility toward children, Kim's mother abandoned her. In the city where Kim was born police officers directed traffic standing on boxes that helped them to be seen above daily commuters. Kim was left in one of those boxes and found by one of those officers. She was dehydrated and in need of medical care, so her next home was a hospital. It's unknown how long she was there, but eventually she was well enough that she was moved to an orphanage. Her story lacks detail from those days.

That historical gap gives way to her adoption story around the age of 3. Her adoptive parents found Kim through their involvement in the Wisconsin foster-care system. By the early 1980s,

Kim had a new adoptive family and became an American citizen.

She was blessed to attend a Lutheran school and learn about Jesus, but questions concerning her birth family always weighed on her heart. Many facts were never discussed, not because her family didn't care, but rather the answers simply didn't exist. Her parents enrolled her in dance classes with other Asian children and she remembers this as a gesture meant to connect her to her homeland. Still, it was difficult to be different, and she can remember other children making fun of those differences as early as first grade. Kim was in high school before she accepted the difference of her ethnic identity.

Concerning her identity as an adopted orphan once abandoned by her birth mother, she was unsettled, tossed about in life and relationships. She came to learn that even the name "Kim" had not been her own from the beginning, but that she had been MeeHee. Kim, looking back at this picture of herself (MeeHee), can tell you from experience that orphaned children often wonder what life would have been like if "orphaned" had never happened. She can tell you that her kind of grief

creates difficulty navigating transitions and predictable life stages that others sail through.

Unable to rewind time, she longed for her future family. Having children and being married promised purpose and presented a future in which broken pieces fit together. The thought of having children gave her hope for having something truly her own and a tangible expression of self. While she could long for the mom she never met, she could not actively love her, hold her or hear her.

God has given Kim three children of her very own and a husband who loves her and loves the Lord. In those three children she can see and touch an earthly expression of past generations God ordained to be her family. But I write this to tell her something more. Where population control and political fear worked to blot out the faces of children and parents from history itself, God was at work to reveal Himself to Kim and Jason and their children.

1 John 4:12 says:

No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God abides in us and his love is perfected in us.

Kim, your family's story is perfect and whole because they can see who they are in Christ as they see Him in you.
