Counseling for individuals and families, and presentations on strengthening families and marriages along with





many other topics, are among the

resources LFS provides.

Another resource, online telehealth sessions, has been particularly helpful the past two years. Using this technology, counselors at the LFS main office in Fort Dodge, Iowa, have been available to support and guide pastors, pastors' wives and others in the South Dakota District, especially during the many months when the coronavirus made its way into our midst and

Noting the tremendous blessing LFS has been to

so many people in South Dakota, the delegates at the December 2021 district convention voted overwhelmingly (91%) to continue and deepen the ministry agreement between our district and LFS for the new triennium (2022-25).

The ongoing agreement will result in the establishment of an LFS office in Sioux Falls and, we hope, in other locations in the state. Counselors will

be on-site in the Sioux Falls office to help not only church workers, but also congregational members with their emotional and mental health.

Telehealth will be available to individuals throughout South Dakota. Adoption services will also be available.

I'm sure you understand that to offer such care for one another does come at a financial cost to our district. For 2022, that cost is \$75,000.

The resolution calls for the district itself to contribute toward the cost of the ministry agreement with LFS for 2022. The district will contribute its share through special gifts we've received to do the Lord's work here in South Dakota.

What about congregations? What is asked of them? In the second-to-last "resolved" of the convention resolution, congregations are called on to contribute "above-and-beyond" gifts to bring emotional and mental health resources to our district through the ministry of LFS. Above and beyond what? Your

congregation's current pledge for district and Synod mission work. We already support missionaries in this above-and-beyond way through the *Together in Mission (TIM)* program. And now we are asking your congregation and the other 104 congregations of the South Dakota District to go above and beyond once more, by prayerfully considering a gift for our ministry agreement with LFS. In mid-March, your congregation's chairman and your pastor received information about how this additional financial gift can be given for 2022.

Your congregation is already doing so much to support the work of God's kingdom through the support you give for Synod and district mission work. Thank you! We praise God for your partnership in the Gospel, and we thank you for whatever you are willing to contribute in this new work we are doing together through the ministry of Lutheran Family Service — a ministry God is using to offer Christ-centered, life-changing hope amid the challenges of life.

Attendees brought donations for the local food pantry and more for Gifts from the Heart.



'God was there...'

RYLEE'S STORY

Dear friends in Christ,

see great value in sharing people's life stories as a way to celebrate God's gifts to us and prepare others to speak on behalf of those (young and old) who cannot speak for themselves. Recently, I have seen another way that these stories can bless our mission: these life stories help to shape the bigger story of the congregations where we all belong. I'll use my own congregation as an example.

In June 2019, I had been serving Mount Calvary, Huron, for about a year. I was still getting to know the congregation and I received a message that a 6-year-old member of our congregation was on her way to Sanford Children's Hospital (what we lovingly refer to as "The Castle.")

That was my headlong introduction into Rylee's story.

As I invited others to pray for Rylee, their responses were intense and indicated that they knew her history. "Rylee? Really, oh no, what's the matter?" "Rylee? Is it serious?" "What does she need?" "How are her mom and dad?"

That June, Rylee had been hospitalized with an infection. In her own words: "One day I was playing outside and I got a tick on my neck. It's normal to have ticks because I live in the country and play outside a lot. The following Monday I started swim lessons. Then, on Tuesday, my neck started to hurt really bad. It felt tight, so I told my mom. She thought it was just my muscles, sore from swimming. That evening I started to run a low fever. Wednesday, I skipped swim lessons because I didn't feel good. My grandma took me to the doctor, and the doctor started me on an antibiotic."

The antibiotic didn't treat the infection. Rylee's fever was recorded at 106 degrees. Rylee says, "The doctors drew lots of blood and ran a lot of tests. We didn't find out it was tularemia until Friday. Once the doctors figured out what was wrong, they put a PICC line in my arm so they could give medicine to (make me) better. I was able to go home on Monday. My mom (Natasha) and dad (Joe) hooked up my medicine to my PICC line at home."

Tularemia is a severe infectious disease caused by bacteria and is transmissible from animals to humans.

By the time I visited Rylee at the Sanford Castle, I had heard her story from many members and friends. At the hospital, her mom and dad started reliving the past.

Rylee was born with gastroschisis, meaning she was born with a large portion of her intestines outside her body. She was delivered by C-section at 34 weeks and rushed into surgery after her baptism. Sadly, doctors were only able to save 25 percent of her intestinal tract. Natasha remembers the moment when she learned that Rylee would be left with only her small intestine and colon. She vaguely remembers hearing the doctor communicating with her after Rylee was carried off to surgery.

"It was like hearing the lady on Charlie Brown," she recalled. "Then the doctor updated the rest of our family. It really wasn't until my mom burst into the room crying, hugging me and saying it's going be OK that it really hit me that everything wasn't as fine as I thought it was."

What began in a fog quickly became more vivid. Life in the NICU is like a rollercoaster, Natasha says. At one point, she and her family were told that Rylee would be at Sanford for a year — 52 weeks, 365 days! But Natasha, an over-achiever, and Joe raced to learn every detail of every task Rylee's homegoing would demand. Eighty-four days later, after some scary setbacks

Making Disciples for Life

Making Disciples for Life has been the triennial mission emphasis of the LCMS since the 2019 convention (replacing Witness, Mercy, Life Together). It captures both the evangelistic fervor of the New Testament – "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations" – and the understanding that disciples of Jesus are taught "all that [Christ has] commanded" so that we may abide in Christ and faithfully serve our neighbor in love.

The Lord preserves "your going out and your coming in" from His Divine Service through faithful preaching, teaching and administration of the Sacraments and the mutual conversation and consolation shared among Christians. From the font of Baptism until we fall asleep in Jesus, Christians live by faith in Christ and in fervent love for others in the humble vocations to which God has called them. By the grace of God in Christ, the Holy Spirit enables us to be faithful disciples of Jesus for life and to suffer all, even death, rather than fall away from Him. In a world of sin and suffering, we bear witness to Christ with joy, serving our neighbor in love and reaching out to the lost that they, too, might become disciples for life.

The current seven mission priorities of the LCMS, established through a process initiated in 2010, are, by the grace of God, intended to guide the work of the Offices of National and International Mission in "making disciples for life." The current mission priorities are:



Plant, sustain, and revitalize Lutheran churches.



Support and expand theological education.



Perform human care in close proximity to Word and Sacrament ministries.



Collaborate with the Synod's members and partners to enhance mission effectiveness.



Enhance early childhood education, elementary and secondary education, and youth ministry.



Promote and nurture the spiritual, emotional, financial, and physical well-being of pastors and professional church workers.



Strengthen and support the Lutheran family in living out God's design.

and training sessions barely short of a medical degree, they were all under one roof.

"We beat the odds," Natasha says. "The last 10 years we have prayed, praised, begged and fought with God. Why us? Why can't we just move forward? Why can't things just go smoothly?

"We did all the things. Quite honestly, looking back, (I see that) God knew we needed Rylee. When we were most vulnerable, weak and broken and we could have thrown in the towel and call it quits on absolutely everything, God was there guiding and leading us in every way. I honestly believe because of Rylee, Joe and I have a relationship between us and with God (that is) stronger than ever."

As I visited with Rylee and Joe and Natasha at Sanford, I got to be a part of that praying and praising, that petitioning and wrestling, asking Christ the Good Shepherd to have mercy on this little lamb. In fact, I saw the entire congregation join in that activity.

Rylee's hospital visit in 2019 brought her family back to the first 84 days of Rylee's life. Rylee's story is the story of her parents and siblings, and her doctors and nurses, and her congregation, all valiantly supporting life ministries. The Lord has seen fit to have Rylee lead our congregation in our Life Ministry. Do you see parallels in your congregation?
