District youth attend Higher Things conference in Montana

outh Dakota was well represented at the 2022 Higher Things Conference held July 19-22 at Montana State University in Bozeman, Mont. The conference theme, "For You," fed middle and high school youth a steady diet of Word and Sacrament for four days. The conference had 843 attendees from 23 states, three countries and 98 congregations.

If you've never been to a Higher Things conference before, imagine it like this.

Breakfast begins at 7 a.m. Students and adult leaders walk from the dorms to the university cafeteria. At 8 a.m., conference musicians and choir members go to rehearsal.

At 9 a.m., hundreds of voices join together to sing Matins. Then students attend the first plenary of the day as speakers teach and answer questions that students have sent via text message. At this conference, speakers were Rev. Duane Bamsch, pastor of Grace Lutheran Church, Grass Valley, Calif., and Higher Things president; and Rev. Dr. Matthew Richard, pastor of St. Paul Lutheran Church, Minot, N.D.

After the plenary, it's lunch time in the cafeteria. Following lunch is Vespers, with singing, preaching and terrific music. The afternoon consists of another plenary and various breakout sessions, primarily led by Higher Things staff or pastors who have also brought their own students to the conference.

Soon, it is supper time. These kids can



sure put down a lot of food! With full stomachs, we all return for the beautiful service of Evening Prayer.

During the evening hours, various activities are held all over our area of the campus, including chalk-drawing competitions, a hilarious and high-caliber talent show and outdoor games like ultimate frisbee and knockerball, in which kids get inside a giant inflatable bubble and run into each other.

A competition among all participating congregations is held during the entire conference. Congregations are divided into four teams, called tetramorphs. Each tetramorph represents one of the Gospel writers. Teams score points by answering questions in breakouts and winning challenges during the free time. They can also lose points for misbehavior. There is a lot of tetramorph spirit!

Finally, around 11:30 p.m., everyone returns to their dorms to pray Compline.

he 50th anniversary of the Puppet Place at the South Dakota State Fair was a fantastic celebration! All of Rev. Andrew Utecht's family was there to help with the puppet show, including his brother, Rev. Peter Utecht, and his mother, Donna. It was wonderful to be back to pre-pandemic numbers again this year. In all, 945 people attended a show. The Black Hills, Brookings, Chamberlain, Milbank and Mitchell zones each had volunteers that were happy to help. Several of these women were first-time helpers and were so excited about the ministry.

Pastor Andrew loved the little hand puppets that LWML members from across the state had made. We handed them out to the children, and the children loved them, too! The puppet booth that Pastor Andrew featured at the district convention was there. The booth, placed by the front door, fascinated children walking by and provided another opportunity to invite them to the shows.

Pastor Peter wrote the Bible story, "Fishers of Men," for the show. It was excellent, as Puppet Place

stories always are. We especially enjoyed the music.

To carry out the theme, Pastor Andrew purchased wooden fish necklaces that were given out to 244 adults. Volunteers also handed out 298 "Cross in your Pocket" gifts, some of which were made by women who attended the district convention, while others were donated by the Sioux Falls Zone. Women from the Pierre Zone made an additional 300 puppets to be added to those made at the district convention. In all, we handed out 476 puppets! It was so fun to watch the puppet show attendees choose the perfect hand puppet to take home.

In celebration of the 50th anniversary of Puppet Place, the exterior of the building was repainted, complete with some LWML purple to set it off. Those purple doors really stand out! Nine volunteers completed this task on a Saturday morning in July. Thank you, volunteers! We also purchased a new awning, table, stools and indoor and outdoor mats. Pastor Andrew was pleased with all of the changes.


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COUNSELOR'S CORNER

Join us for life march



ood news makes me glad. A smile on the face of my wife brings me joy. The sound of my children getting along and laughing when we are all together is an occasion to rejoice. I am uplifted by a friendly note or email or when my neighbor waves and shouts a greeting from his yard.

Kindness is uplifting. I assume that is a universal reality for people all over the world.

If so, then why does Jesus say:

"Blessed are you when others revile you and persecute and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account." (MATT. 5:11)

Insults hurt. Rumors wreck lives. Name-calling happens to people of every generation and it is just as painful at age 50 as it is at age 15. Why would we ever rejoice in being attacked in any way? Only when it means we are included in the life and victory of Christ.

In Matt. 5:12, Jesus says:

"Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for so they persecuted the prophets who were before you."

The prophets pointed to Christ in word and deed. The apostles did the same and they were persecuted. We follow in their footsteps, pointing to Christ. That means we will face rejection and persecution.

Persecution hurts, but so does a good workout. When I ride 100 miles on my bike, I am sore the next day. If your favorite sports team beats the opposing team on the latter team's home field, your team will be booed. A parent who disciplines her child might face pushback from the child or even from society.

When we publicly profess our faith, we are proclaiming the victory of Jesus' death and resurrection to everyone in our midst. That includes people who oppose even the idea of God, not to mention the eternal Christ in time and space, and the Scriptures.

We plan to face that battle again on Jan. 20, 2023, in Washington, D.C., for the annual national March for Life. If ever we thought that overturning *Roe v. Wade* would resolve the arguments over abortion, we have discovered a different reality now. The overturning has only made extremists within the pro-abortion movement more vicious

and destructive. In printed and online ads, abortion advocates have called for violence against pro-life advocates and crisis pregnancy centers. Name-calling seems mild in light of the riots some abortion advocates support. In light of this, some folks have expressed concern over their own safety at an event like the National March for Life.

Sure, since *Roe v. Wade* has been overturned, the 2023 March for Life could be an amazing victory celebration. On the other hand, it could be the place where protestors choose to wage war against the pro-life movement and its people. I have no idea what to expect, and I have yet to see anyone confident in making a prediction. You need to make the decision about going for yourself as you seek God's will for your witness and well-being.

We live under the Gospel Christ has given us. Nevertheless, please consider the national march as an opportunity to walk with your fellow Christians, and the apostles and prophets before you.

Have you been blessed to know the difference Jesus has made using your work and witness in His name? I'd enjoy hearing that life story. A fellow worker may need to hear it. Contact me at:

'The devoted, devotional life'

Higher Things retreat lifts up high school youth

ur Savior Lutheran Church, Aberdeen, hosted the 2022 South Dakota District Higher Things Confirmation Retreat Aug. 12-13. Rev. Bret Bierman, pastor of St. Paul, Stratford; Trinity, Mansfield; and St. John's, Aberdeen, spoke on the retreat theme, "The Devoted, Devotional Life" and Revs. Jordan Andreasen (Our Savior, Aberdeen, and St. John, Columbia), Jeremy Yeadon (St. John's, Groton, and Zion, Andover) and Colin Ford (Concordia, Cresbard, and Immanuel, Wecota) preached during services. Breakout sessions were taught by Rev. Samuel Bobby (St. Paul's, Aberdeen, and St. Paul's, Leola), Rev. Jacob Smith (St. Paul's, Aberdeen) and DCE Michael Leapley (St. Paul's, Aberdeen).

The youth had an incredible time. "I really liked the atmosphere and being around other Lutherans my age," August Bobby said. "It was a lot of fun."

He added that he appreciated being able to ask the pastors questions.

The fellowship that a Higher Things retreat provides is invaluable. What a blessing to show South Dakota youth they are not alone in the Lutheran faith. Deep and meaningful questions abounded as the youth considered what it means to lead a "devoted, devotional life."

Tying into the retreat's theme, DCE Leapley taught a breakout session on the form and structure of a "collect" prayer so participants could add this church practice to their own devotional time. The youth were quick learners. By the end of the class they were writing collects of their own.

Pastor Smith led a session on how to read Psalms, and he engaged the youth in some tough questions. Pastor Bobby taught on Christian identity. He explained that all secular activities, such as sports or musical performances, are ultimately lawbased. Therefore, Christians have a unique privilege in hearing and proclaiming the Gospel!

Similarly, Pastor Bierman explained that the world tries to define us in many ways and that people are bound to have opinions of each other. But above all, our identity in Christ is what matters most. Pastor Bierman reminded participants that each of them is a "redeemed, baptized child of God." God holds us in His arms, and nothing can change that. We have already won because of what Christ has done for us.

Bierman then echoed the words that God so frequently shares in His Word — "Fear not!" We have nothing to fear because Christ has conquered all. Living as Easter people, we have the freedom to "thank and praise, serve and obey by loving our neighbor."
